

This stone is very similar to several other monuments in town, including gravestones.  It is a fairly plain stone, made of light gray with black flecks granite. It has no visible base.  It is 28 inches wide by 25 inches high and 8 inches deep.
HISTORICAL NARRATIVE  see continuation sheet  Explain the history of the object, and how it relates to the development of the community
The park was originally part of the front yard of the house at 105 Carlisle St. The intersection of Brick Kiln & Carlisle formed at dead end in front of the house. It is believed that during the 1920s the Town purchased the land where the monument stands for \$1, so they could extend Carlisle St. to join Gorham St. However, it does not show on the Assessors' maps.
Peter Blazonis, a member of the 101st Airborne Unit, was killed on Hamburg Hill in Vietnam on June 18, 1969.  He is believed to be the only East Chelmsford veteran to have died in Vietnam. Prior to his death he had been awarded the national Defense Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal with one bronze star, Vietnam Campaign Ribbon, Parachutist Badge and Expert Badge with Rifle Bar. He was also awarded posthumously the Purple Heart, Good Conduct Badge and the Combat Infantryman Badge. The son of Albert & Christina Blazonis, he grew up at 32 Asbury St., now [2002] called 32 Robert Bigelow St.
