

The 1961 dedication was planned by the East Chelmsford Residential Association & local Post 366, American Legion. Selectmen, the Town Counsel, and Representative Brad Morse were invited. Four local area Veterans Posts were represented, one of which formed a color guard. There were brief addresses, music was furnished by Sacred heart Bugle & Drum Corps, a salute was fired by a squad from Fort Devens, and "Taps" was sounded by East Chelmsford resident Raymond Greeley. Refreshments were served at the East School. "The sincere thanks of a grateful community [was] at last permanently recorded."

By 1992 a small bench had been added to the area, and at the request of an area resident, the rotten flag pole was replaced with an aluminum one, and the Town Manager promised "to look into fixing up the monument." which was then "in deplorable condition."

In May 1998 the name of Edward Williams was added, at the urging of his widow, Martha. "He never complained" about his name being left off, but shortly before his death he said he "always regretted not having his name placed on the monument." Apparently it was just an oversight, and when the town's veterans' agent, Marty Walsh, and his assistant obtained his military records, the name of Edward Williams was added to the monument in time for the Memorial Day celebration. He "served as a radio operator in the Army from 1941-1945. After training in New Jersey and Oklahoma, his main tour of duty was in Japan. Williams was part of the first series of troops who entered Nagasaki to clean up after the atom bomb had been dropped."

The area and the monument were cleaned up by the Town Engineers'/Park Departments.
