Explain the history of the object, and how it relates to the development of the community

The idea of erecting this monument began when Mike Kinney, founder of the Park, decided to build a bandstand on the Park property. The Belleville family had donated paving services when the Park was built, and it was agreed that the bandstand would be dedicated to William E. Belleville, Sr. The monument was made by Luz Granite Corp. in 1993 and stored in the showroom at Luz Monument Corp. for several years. The new Park committee realized that it could not bear the expense or liability of a bandstand. The Park Committee wished to honor the Bellevilles, and the Belleville family wanted the monument to be placed somewhere. It was agreed to put a new stone in the Veterans Memorial Park on the concrete pad with other monuments. It was installed on the concrete pad Nov. 8, 2003.

William E. Belleville served as a Master Sergeant in the U.S. Army during World War II at Fort Bragg, in California, and in Tokyo. He was in charge of tanks, under General Patten. He, his wife, Margaret, and their children moved to Chelmsford from Lowell in 1964 or 65. William joined his father's Asphalt Paving Co., which had been formed in 1951. He died Dec. 3, 1988, aged 68, and the paving company is being run by William & Margaret's son Walter in 2005.


