


### Foreword



And if so given, we may be assured that our beloved American Democracy will rise from this period of turmoil and stress to a higher realization of our national ideals, that more truly than ever before all men shall be equal, and shall to a fuller extent attain life, liberty, and happiness.

To reach this desired end, a trained, disciplined, and clear thinking citizenry is essential. In this sense, you, young men and young women in Chelmsford High School, with your mates in every school and college of the land, are the Hope of America.







A bright spot only here and there.


Out there the sky won't always be blue,






## Athletics



### "Code of Ethics"
